SECOND GRADE.—Reading. Word Lessons. Arithmetic completed. Higher Lessons in English. Physical Geography. Tennessee History. Morals and Manners. Composition. Drawing. Singing.

NORMAL.

FIRST GRADE.—Logic and Oratory. Algebra. Book-keeping. Rhetoric. Composition. Physiology. Botany. Drawing. Singing.

SECOND GRADE.—Literature. Geometry. Physics. General History. Government. Composition. Political Economy.

THE ACADEMY is at Pleasant Hill, a slight elevation on the Cumberland Plateau, seventeen miles east of Sparta, on the old turnpike road between Nashville and Knoxville.

The school was established as a permanent institution in the year 1884, by the American Missionary Association, and is at present sustained by it.

There are at present three substantial buildings connected with the school.

The academy building contains a large main room, a primary room, and three recitation rooms, also ample hat and cloak rooms.

Directly opposite stands a three-story dormitory, the rooms of which are completely furnished for the accommodation of the young men. Near by is the dormitory for the young ladies, which is spacious, and contains many well furnished rooms. In this building are the large, cheerful dining-room, and the rooms for the culinary department.

Too great emphasis cannot be put upon the unsurpassed location of the Academy. It is a spot in which young people can study amid the healthful, educa-

ting and inspiring influences of nature, free from the distracting and demoralizing influences of towns, there being no saloon within a radius of ten miles.

The object of the school is the Christian education of its pupils, and to furnish them with a thorough preparation for teaching, according to advanced methods.

MUSIC.

Facilities for instruction in both vocal and instrumental music are ample. The elements of vocal music are taught without extra charge. For practice in instrumental music there are two organs and an upright piano.

ADMISSION AND PROMOTION.

The only requirement for admission is a good moral character. All students will find classes suited to their needs. It is earnestly desired, that, as far as possible, all the students shall be present at the opening of the school, and follow the regular course of study as laid down in the catalogue.

Upon the completion of any of the courses the pupils are entitled to certificates.

The standard of excellence is one hundred per cent. A scholar cannot drop a study at the end of the time allotted to it, or be promoted in a study continued for a

series of terms, unless he has attained seventy per cent. This allows all who are reasonably faithful in their work to go forward in their studies, and secures that grading of classes which is essential to any high standard of work in the class-room.

LIBRARY.

Through the benevolence of friends in the North, we have a library of over seven hundred volumes, including encyclopedias. These are exerting a silent, but powerful educating influence, which more than repays the generous donors.

LITERARY AND SOCIAL ADVANTAGES.

All the teachers recognize the fact that their work and responsibilities are not confined to the school-room. They constantly exert themselves to make the school-life pleasant and profitable.

The students support a literary and debating society, which during the past year has been well sustained, and its influence has been most beneficial to the young people.

RELIGIOUS PRIVILEGES.

The influences of the school are decidedly Christian, though not sectarian. The study of the Bible is considered fundamental, and is, therefore, made a daily exercise.

On Wednesday evening a weekly prayer-meeting is supported by the teachers and students. An active Society of Christian Endeavor, with which nearly all the scholars are connected, by its Sunday evening meeting, and its training in individual work, has been most helpful in promoting the Christian growth of the Academy.

No deduction for absence for less than one week. All bills must be paid in advance.

REGULATIONS.

The government of the school is such as is needful for the good of all; and the ultimate end of all discipline is to aid in establishing habits of thoughtfulness,

self-control, and courtesy. No student who is unwilling to meet these requirements, or who seems to lack appreciation of the benefits received, can expect to be retained.

Students are held responsible for any damage they may do to Academic property. Students are required to attend the regular Sunday-school and church services on the Sabbath, and daily chapel exercises. No firearms, no use of intoxicating liquors or tobacco in any form, and no profanity, will be allowed in or about the school buildings or grounds.
