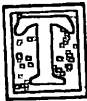

Pleasant Hill Academy



THE Academy is at Pleasant Hill, on a slight elevation of the Cumberland Plateau, on the old turnpike between Knoxville and Nashville. Its location is seventeen miles east of Sparta and about five miles south of Johnson Stand, a station on the Tennessee Central Railroad, and seven miles east of DeRossett, on the N., C. & St. L. Railroad, and eleven miles west of Crossville.

The school was established as a permanent institution in the year 1884, by the American Missionary Association and is at present sustained by it.

Too great emphasis cannot be put upon the unsurpassed location of the Academy. It is a spot in which the young people can study amid the healthful, educating and inspiring influences of nature, free from the distracting and demoralizing influences of town.

The object of the school is the Christian education of its pupils and to furnish them with a thorough preparation for teaching according to advanced methods.

MUSIC

Facilities for instruction in both vocal and instrumental music are ample. The elements of vocal music are taught without extra charge. For practice in instrumental music there are organs and pianos.

ADMISSION AND PROMOTION

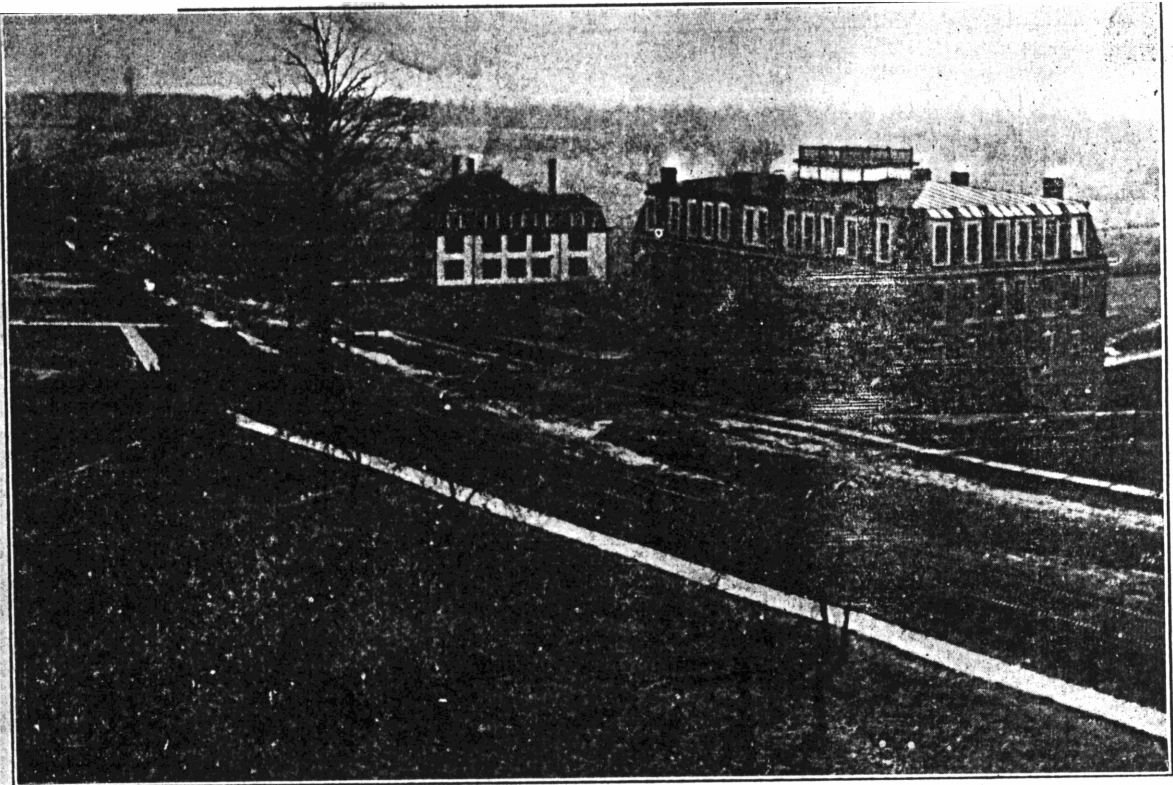

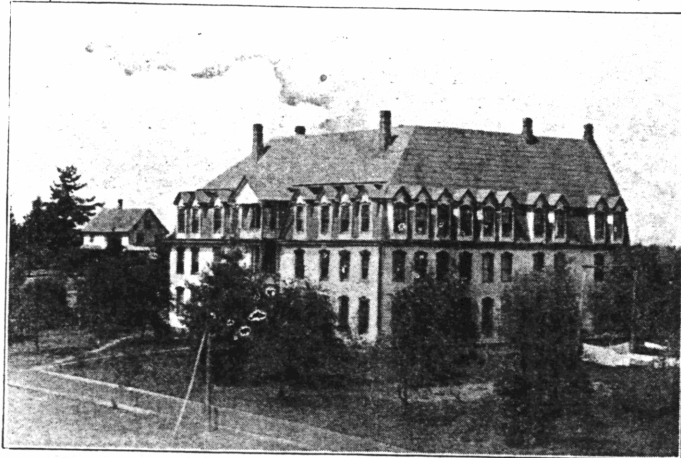

The standard of excellence is one hundred per cent; seventy-five per cent allows promotion. This allows all who are reasonably faithful in their work to go forward in their studies and secures that grading of classes, which is essential to any high standard of work in the class room.

LIBRARY

Through the benevolence of friends in the North, we have a library of over one thousand volumes, including en-

cyclopedias. These are exerting a silent but powerful influence, which more than repays the generous donors.

LITERARY AND SOCIAL ADVANTAGES

All the teachers recognize the fact that their work and responsibilities are not confined to the school room. They constantly exert themselves to make student life pleasant and profitable.

The students and teachers support literary and debating societies, which during the past year have been well sustained, and their influence has been beneficial to the young people.

RELIGIOUS PRIVILEGES

The influences of the school are decidedly Christian, though not sectarian. The study of the Bible is considered fundamental, and is, therefore, made a regular exercise.

On Wednesday evening a weekly prayer meeting is supported by the teachers and students. An active society of Christian Endeavor, by its Sunday evening meeting and its training in individual work, has been most helpful in promoting the Christian growth of the Academy.

REGULATIONS

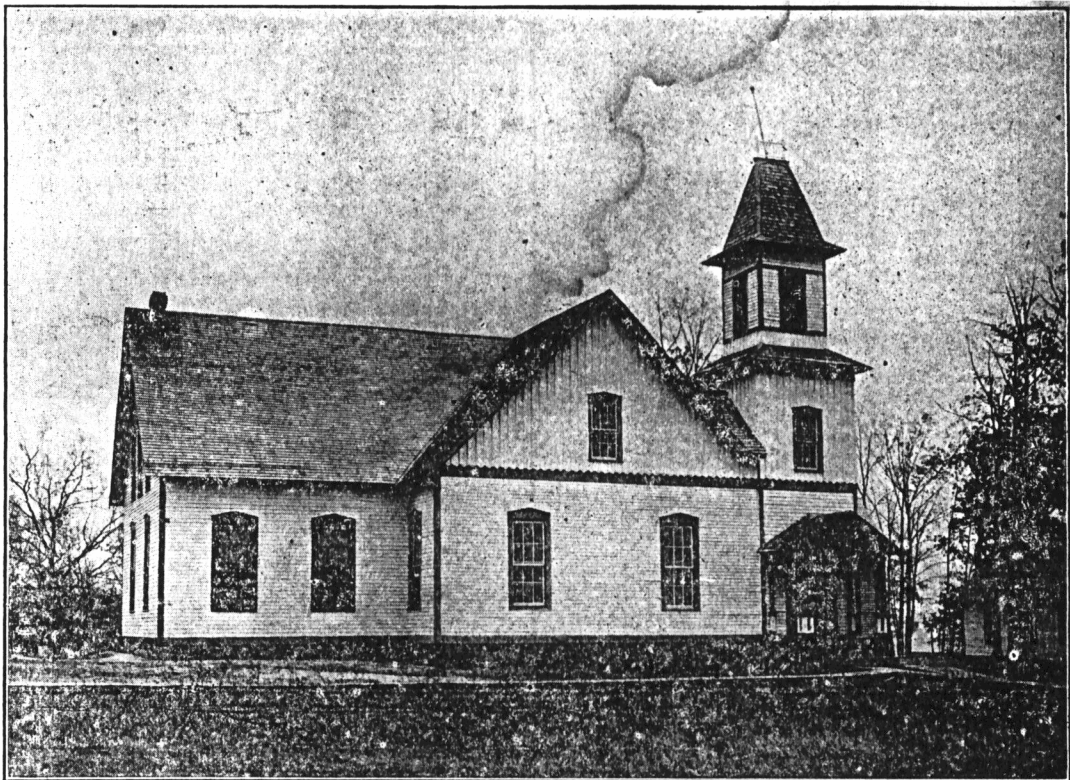
The government of the school is such as is needful for the good of all; and the ultimate end of all discipline is to aid in establishing habits of thoughtfulness, self control and courtesy. No student who is unwilling to meet these requirements, or who seems to lack appreciation of the benefits received, can expect to be retained.

Students are held responsible for any damage they may do Academic property. Students are required to attend the regular Sunday school and church services on the Sabbath, and daily chapel exercises. Absence during the term will be allowed only to a limited extent. Terms open on Tuesday to avoid the necessity of students coming in on Sunday.

No fire arms, no use of intoxicating liquors or tobacco in any form, and no profanity will be allowed in or about the school buildings or grounds.

Students desiring to work to meet expenses should correspond with the Principal before coming.

No work will be given students who persist in the use of tobacco.



ACADEMY BUILDING—was erected in 1835 and enlarged in 1900. It contains study rooms for Normal and Grammar Grades and four recitation rooms. It will accommodate from 200 to 275 students. This building is also used for religious services. The **PRIMARY BUILDING** to the right, built in 1890, will accommodate 75 children and is a model building for a district school house.

Through nine years, systematic instruction is given in plain sewing, cutting, making and repairing.

Course begins with weaving, braiding, paper folding, followed by book and models covering the full course in hand sewing, consisting of basting, hemming, gathering, darning, patching, buttonholes, cutting and making undergarments, economical cutting of material, drafting dress patterns to measurement, cutting and making dresses.
