## Remembering Pleasant Hill Special Exhibit

The excitement grows and there is an urgency to the necessary hard work every spring when Pioneer Hall Museum is being readied for the summer season. This is especially true this year as Jym Mitchell has been working many hours on the special exhibit that needs to be ready May 3. The historical society board is indebted to him for his willingness to interview people who recall their memories of Pleasant Hill from years ago and who are willing to tape their recollections for the museum archives. These memories of the academy, the hospital, the community and the people will be

transferred from tapes to cds and will eventually be available for listening. Hopefully, this project will continue and more people will be asked to share their family histories as they recall their family stories about life here through the years.

Also part of the special exhibit will be a gift from **Dinah Cole Goodwin** who gave the museum a well-loved, well-used child's tea set that was purchased by her parents, **Denton and Virginia Cole**, in 1953 from Smith's Store. This was a treasured Christmas gift and today bears evidence of countless tea parties that Dinah and her friends enjoyed.

### The Bell Began to Ring...

“Another thing happened when I was there, which proved the courage of our students at P.H.A. and their tenacity and stick-to-itiveness. One noon, just as the head-boss at the tables began to serve at each table, the old Paul Revere School bell began to ring. That meant one thing - fire! Every young man laid down his napkin, marched coolly out of the dining-room, as if trained for the emergency. Then they ran, - I ran too, for I thought it was my primary building; and my little folks, who were too far from home to go home for dinner might be in danger. Every boy who ran by me called out, ‘Don’t run, Miss Goar, I’ll look after your children.’ When I saw it was the chapel on fire, at the roof, I still ran. How those P.H.A. students worked, just like beavers, to put out the fire! The girls ran to the girls’ dormitory, and from the cistern drew water and formed a bucket brigade. The young men ran to Dodge well and spring, formed bucket brigades - and the students saved the building. Supt. Wheeler and Prof. Blanks directed their efforts great.” Emma Dodge adds this note: “One of the old boys has recently written how he went up through the interior out through the burning roof and stopped the fire before it got to the belfry. He was one who had a most important part in saving the building. This was Grover Billingsley....The insurance adjuster who was here a week later said he had never known a fire to be put out by means of buckets when it had had such headway.” Lillian Goar Galloway (or Gallaway), PHA Teacher, 1903-06, as quoted in Emma Dodge’s History of Pleasant Hill

## Here's the Scoop

This scoop has a history! Sylvanus Suttle was its original owner. Mr. Suttle's store was located where the Pleasant Hill Town Hall is now. He gave the scoop to his friend Claude Mathes who owned and operated a small country store in a building which sat on the corner of Cottage and Main. Horace and Eva Burgess had a store in a white, two-story building which still stands at the far west end of Main Street. When C.T. and Sandra (Burgess) Mathes purchased the store from Sandra's parents, Claude passed the scoop along to them. C.T. and Sandra operated that store until they opened Mathes Market on the corner of Main Street and Browntown Road where the Smith store had burned down. That property became the Village Market when the Mathes' sold it to Dave Hyder. Now the traveling scoop has found a home in Pioneer Hall Museum, a gift from the Mathes'. On your next visit to the museum, pause in the country store and check out the cash register that also came from C.T. and Sandra, the post office ledger that records business from 1887 to 1892, the years when John Frey Sr., George E.
