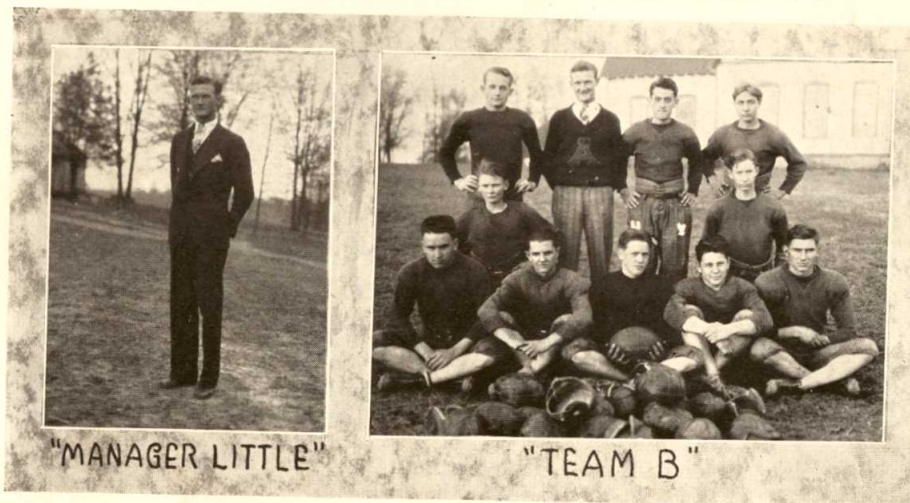
## FOOTBALL

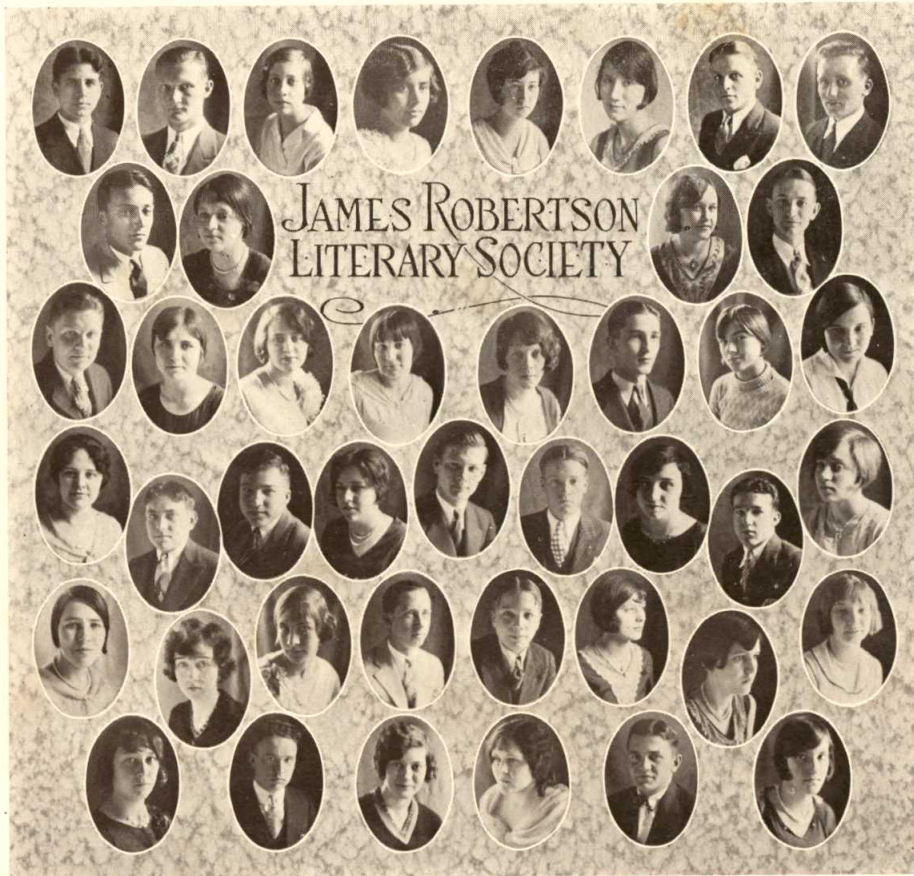
