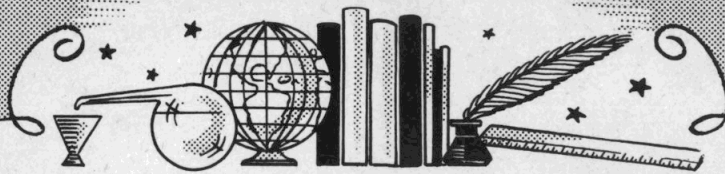

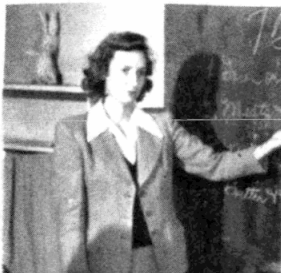

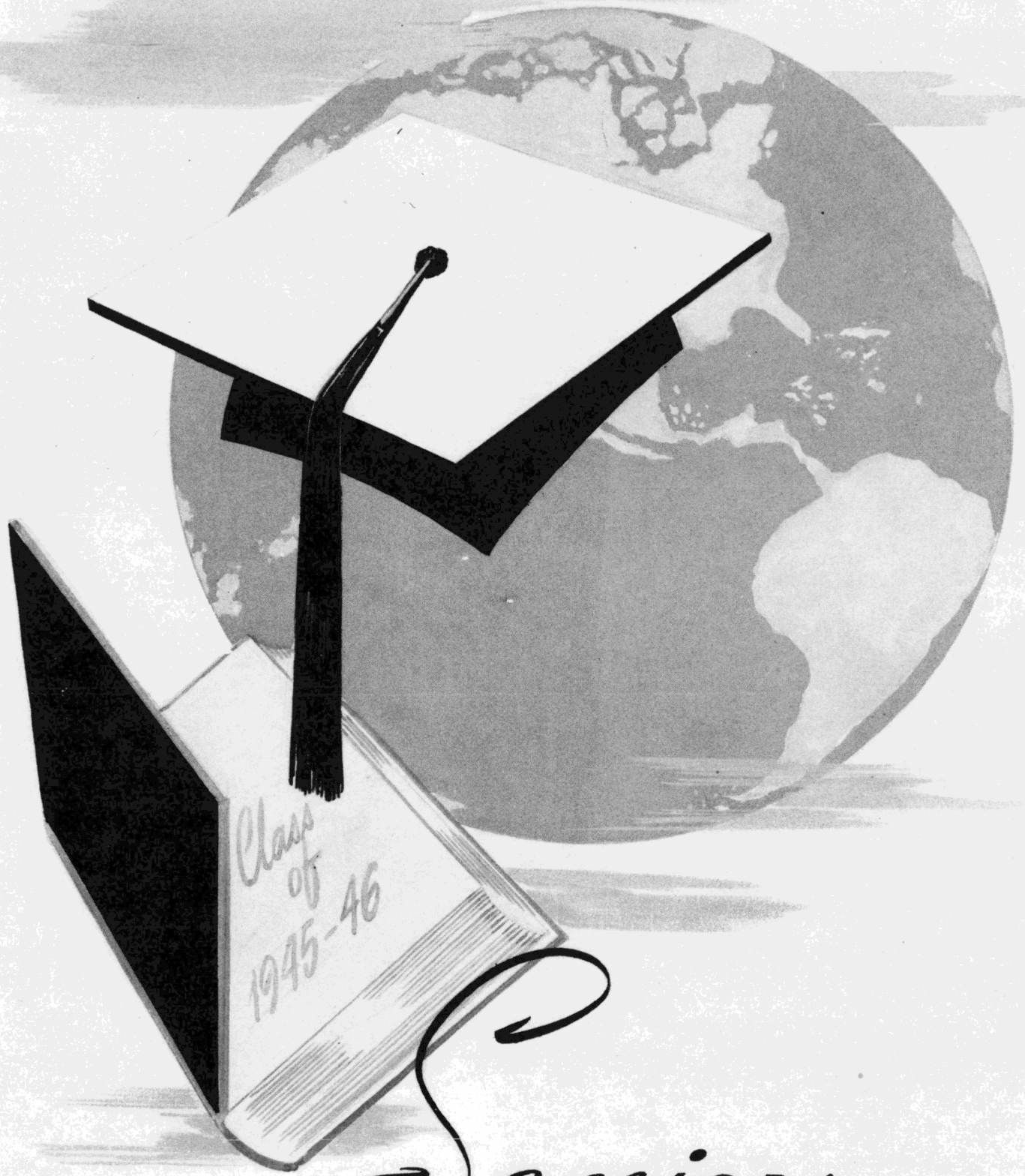

## CLASS HISTORY

We did singing and folk games daily. It was due to this early start that such a large majority of our class has gone on Folk Team Touts. We learned English from our class sponsor, Mr. Parsons, and it was our class which brought out the famous "Fox" which was written and printed by members of our class. At the end of the year we felt confident enough to do a school annual, the first ever to be published on the campus.

We distinguished ourselves, too, in basketball when our girls won the class tournaments.

That year our leaders were president Lee Rappoport; vice-president, Vernon Ervin; secretary-treasurer, Benson Collett.

This year was merely a warm-up for what was ahead in the next three dashes.

As we rounded the bend and began the second lap of the race we lost sixteen members of the original team but gained three new members; Floyd Wilson, Lena Rose Tollett and John Bosson. Twenty seven strong, we started out on English, biology, ancient history, and Bible. In English we organized a club, "The Duz", which met bi-weekly and which at Christmas time gave the school a \$50.00 war bond. Also at Christmas time, as a climax of our Bible study, we presented the Christmas pageant and play, "The Christmas Guest".

This year our sponsor was Miss Elsie Walker; our president, Floyd Wilson; vice-president, Robert Van Winkle; secretary-treasurer, Imogene Spears.

Eight members dropped out before we dashed into the Junior year. Floyd Wilson was called into the navy before that lap was completed. When he left our vice-president took over the leadership of our class, assisted by secretary Benson Collett; and treasurer, Ann Cunningham. J.E. Rackley was elected vice-president. That year Miss Campbell was our sponsor.

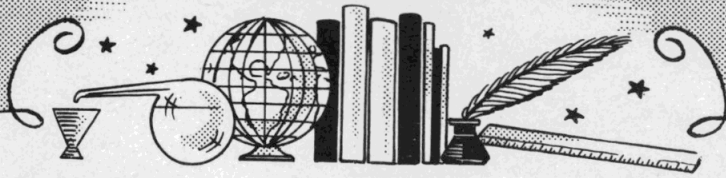
Our hurdles this year were labeled English, art, economics, geometry, and agriculture. For Thanksgiving the junior English class under Miss Walker's direction gave "Nathan Hale". Later, on Class Day, we were pleasantly surprised to receive the coveted English cup.

The theme of our junior-senior banquet was South Sea Islandic. Aided by Miss Campbell we carved palm tree pins for favors, and turned the dining room into a clearing in a tropical jungle. Outstanding in our menu were T-bone steaks and banana splits. The Academy was another part of the jungle with a hut on the stage, a pool with a many colored rainbow reflected into it in the center of the room, and a refreshment booth in the corner. Junior girls in Burmese costumes did a native dance. Other juniors gave a play "The Wedding" in the gym.

This year, our last lap to make the other three complete, saw four less old members and Betty Driver, Betty Wilhite, Laurine Seegraves and Robert DeLozier as our new ones. Ann Cunningham was president; Marie Moore, vice-president; Elizabeth Tucker, secretary; and Lois Baisley, Treasurer. Various seniors took these different subjects; history, English, art, American democracy, chemistry, agriculture, and home economics.

Our thanks and best wishes go to the Muellers who for the past two years have guided and cheered us on from the sidelines.

"NEW SHOP OPENED BY FAMOUS BEAUTICIAN"

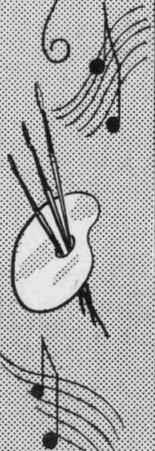

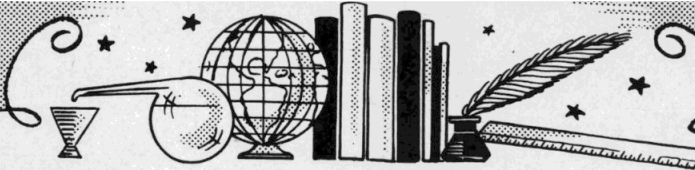


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# Juniors

Under the harvest moon of OCTOBER games, horse racing, corn husking dancing and cider and doughnuts made up a corn husking party.

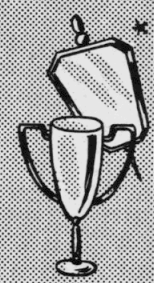
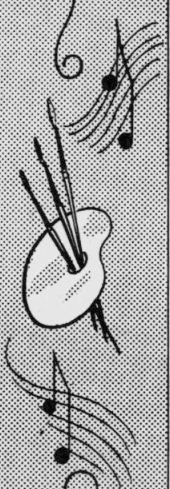

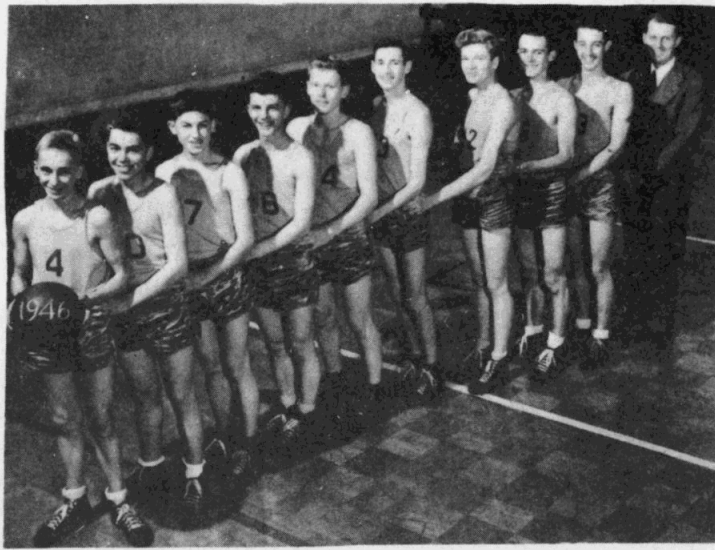
Due to some misunderstanding, which could not be settled for a time, P.H.A.'s teams were barred from the tournaments, but we have high hopes of participating next year.

Betty Wilhite, Wilfred Mueller and Betty Driver helped to carry the crimson and gold through as cheer leaders.

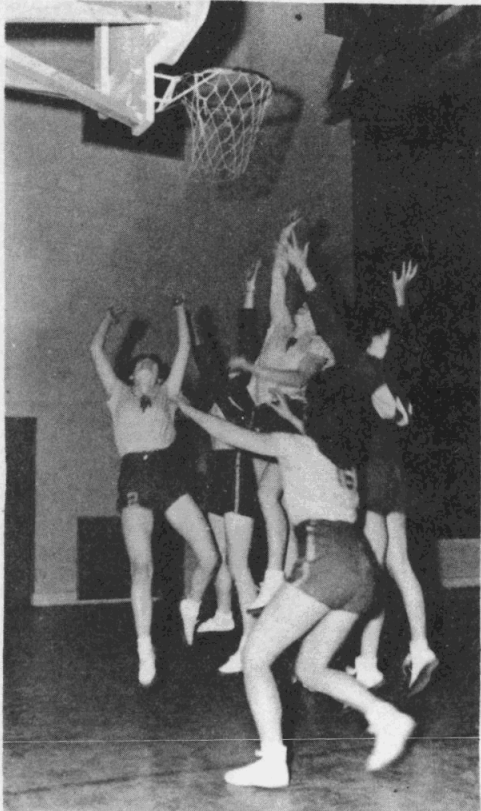
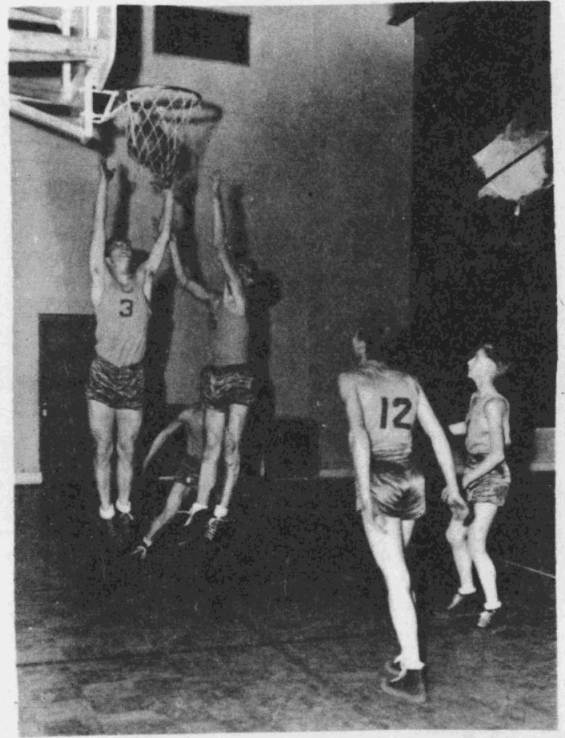
