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HISTORY YEAR 1948-1949

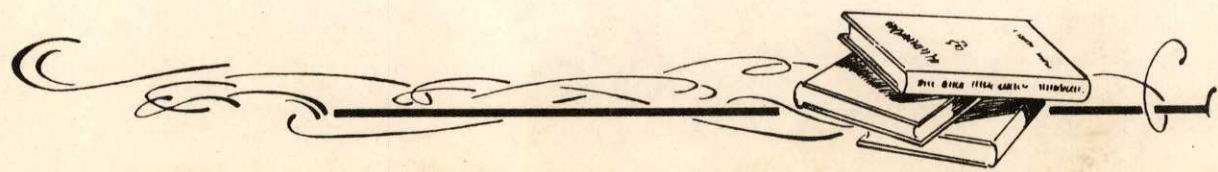
Pleasant Hill opened its second year as a County High School on August first. Our previous year had ended the last of May and so soon was the campus alive again as busses began to unload and students gazed at the unfinished building, resigning themselves to another year of cramped quarters. Cheered by a generous gift from our good friend, Mrs. Munn, and with our ever-faithful P.T.A. on the job, we resolved to make the best of the existing conditions.

The first month opened with Lyle Smith as substitute teacher of Science, Miss Martha Johnson substitute in Jr. High School and Miss Mary Tollett in place of Mrs. Anderson who had resigned from fifth grade position. Near the end of the month, Mr. Wm. 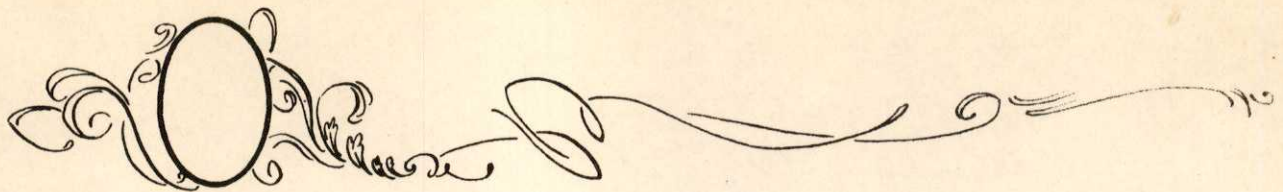

Various instructional movies were scheduled, and Mr. Helm purchased the radio-recorder-record player for which Mrs. Munn had sent the money. Glee Club, Dramatics Club, Science Club, etc. were organized and before we knew it, October.

Highlights of October were the unexpected snowfall before killing frost, and soon after, the ball games with Beech Bluff, Mr. Helm's former school from nearly 300 miles away. We split honors with them, and later in the month played Homesteads, Spencer, Crossville, and doing well. About this time a bum knee lost Betty Ruth Myers to the girls' team. The tempo of campus activities increased, grade cards came our for first term, with accompanying vows of, " I'll do better next time."

November saw the year book plans begun and Senior rings ordered. What excitement! Several good chapel programs this month, in which the Dramatics Club took part. More basket ball as we met Clarkrange, Rickman and Spencer again. The grade boys remained undefeated by again swamping Mayland.

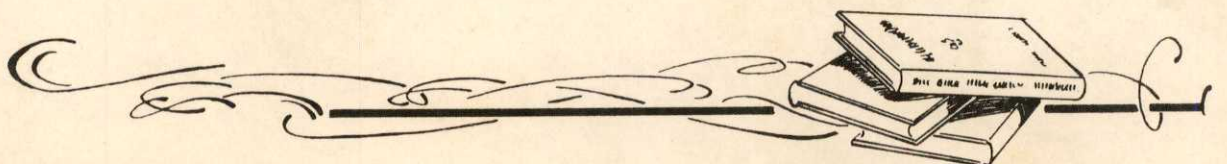
The 10-A elected Miss Qualls, one of the new teachers, as their sponsor, and the 10-B elected Mrs. Harriman as their sponsor.

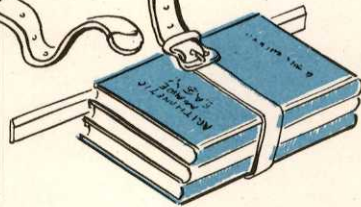
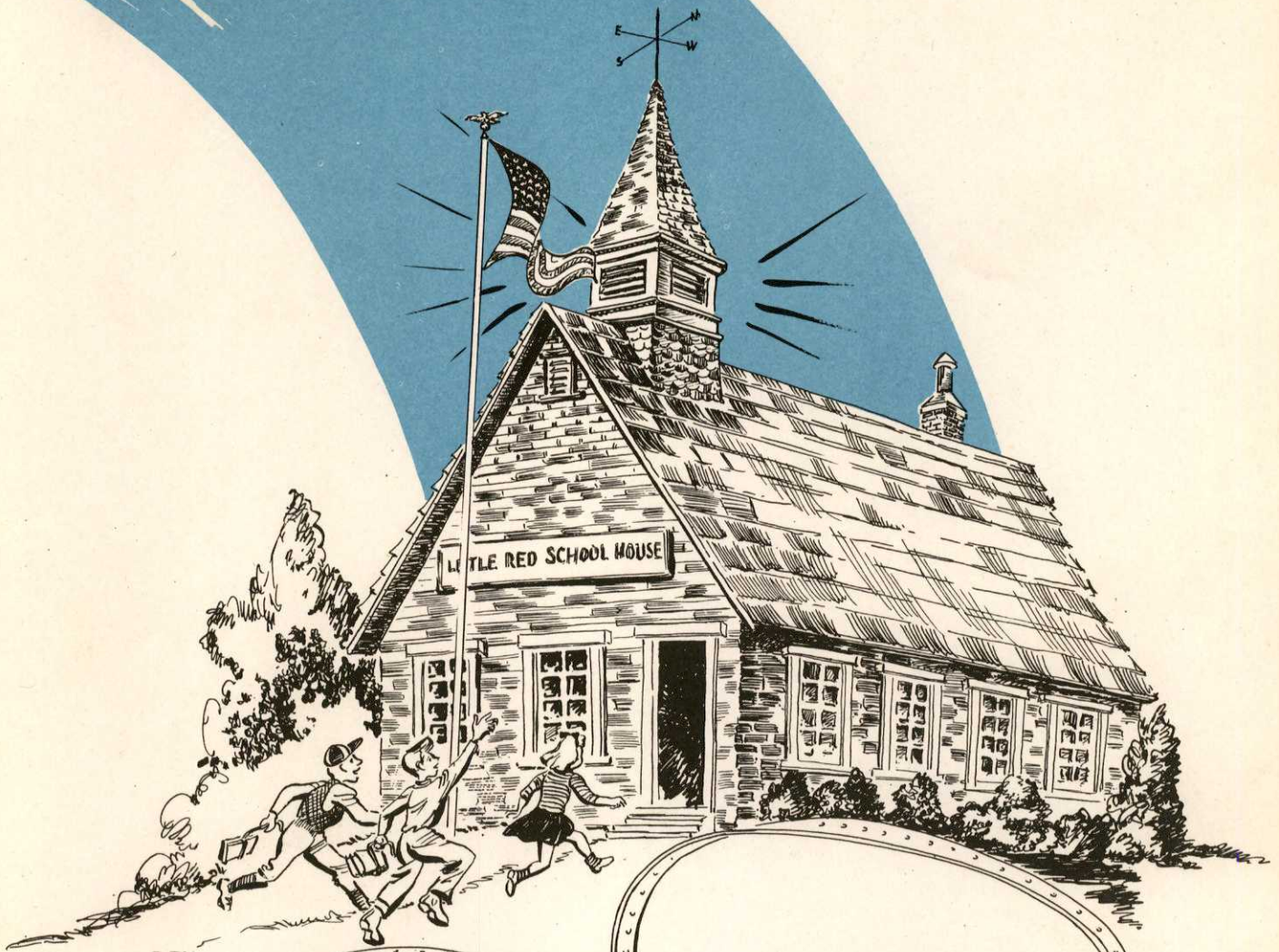
Neither of our teams won a very large percent of their games but it was certainly not the fault of our coach, Mr. Loggins. He has been one of the best and a friend of all.

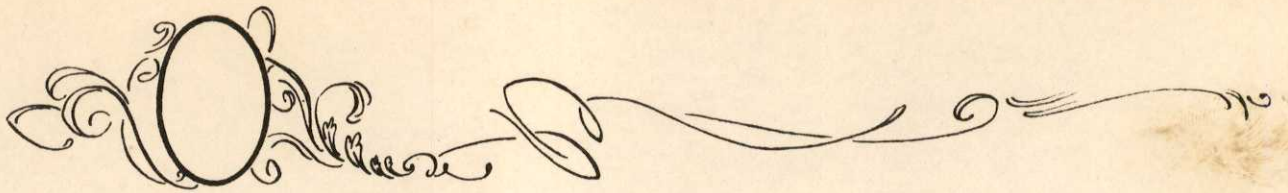

Mr. Marriott is the seventh grade sponsor. He is a nice sponsor and very much liked by the class.

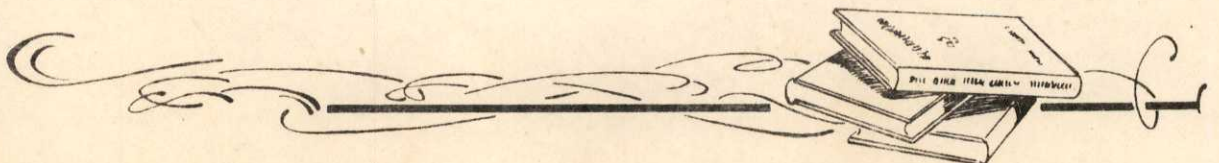
The officers of our class are: Jackie Paul Randolph, president, Martin Iles, vice-president, and Jay E. Page, secretary-treasurer.

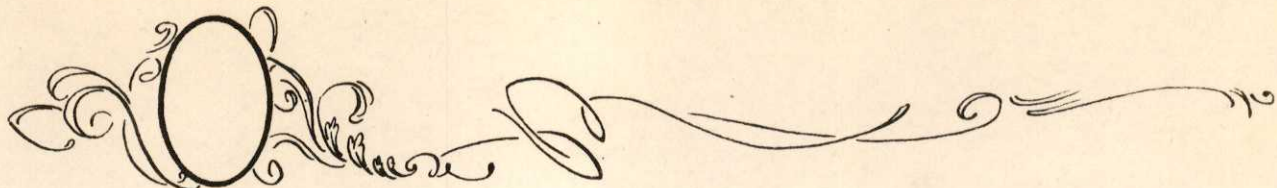

PLEASANT HILL ACADEMY

During the past two years the work in Pleasant Hill under the direction of the American Missionary Association has been changing from a program of formal education to one of an informal nature. In formal education we furnish the salaries of four teachers in the Pleasant Hill School, thus continuing support to formal education. In informal education services of our farm, our shop, our crafts department; and other facilities are offered with the hope that these services will enrich the lives of our neighbors.

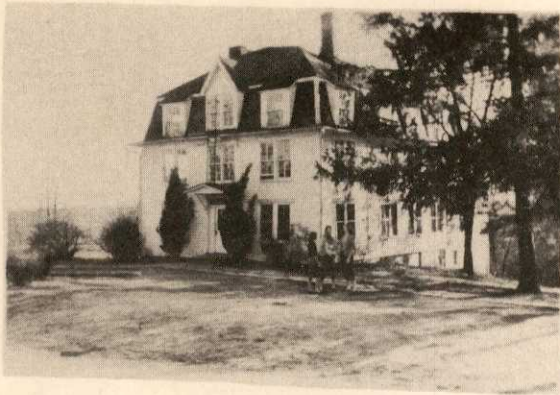
Farm services offered to the community are offered so that we may all together obtain better rural living. The community shop is being of assistance to those who need help in building, repairing, and remodelling their homes and farm equipment. Our craftshop is a place where people, both men and women, are learning the rich distinction of home made articles for use in their homes and for sale. Pioneer Club Room is used by various community organizations as a meeting place. The guest house, former principal's house, is being operated in order that friends of Pleasant Hill may have overnight accommodations when they visit us. Gifts which come to our thrift shop furnish an inexpensive source of clothing and other articles for sale. In turn, funds received from the resale of these gifts help to pay costs of running the Pleasant Hill Community Center.
