WE WILL KEEP FAITH

We of Pleasant Hill have been blessed with a heritage handed down to us from the very beginning of this community. It is a heritage in faith--a faith that has had a big share in building this school into what it is today.

If we could turn back seventy-five years we would not see the scene we see today. There would be no buildings, no campus, no playgrounds, only wilderness with a few cabins scattered here and there. The school, if any, would be a one room building very poorly furnished with insufficient means to make the students comfortable. The children would walk for miles through all kinds of weather for the little bit of book learning that they would get.

Pleasant Hill, even in the earliest days, was fortunate enough to have people interested in education. Many of the names are familiar to us today. Names such as Wightman, Tanner, Jarvis, Frey, Stanley and many others will never be forgotten because of their contributions to Pleasant Hill.

These people, seeing the need of education, made the beginning of Pleasant Hill possible. They furnished the land, the lumber to build, the labor. They furnished the spirit, the faith, the sweat to give their children and their children's children a school and an education.

A teacher was needed and at the request of the people, Benjamin Dodge came to Pleasant Hill. He saw the determination of these pioneers and with their help began to build. They built the Academy, Pioneer Hall, Dodge Hall, Wheeler, Hopkins, Roberts Hall and others. These buildings were built during the days of Pleasant Hill Academy; now Pleasant Hill is a county school. Other buildings have been built or are being built. Many other changes will take place in the future--changes for the better or for the worst but even as things have changed from the beginning, they will always change until the end.

The objectives of the first settlers were to furnish a school and an education for their children. With their faith, determination and work they realized this objective. Today we are still carrying out this objective as each student receives his diploma from this school.

Other objectives were added to the first ones. The main ones were: to give the students attending Pleasant Hill the type of education to fit their particular needs and to work together with the parents and members of this community for the good of our school and this community.

As each goal is reached and new ones are set, we realize it takes a lot of faith, a lot of determination and a lot of work to reach each one. If our pioneer founders had not shown faith and a determination to bring education to their children, where would Pleasant Hill be today? If Father Dodge had given up at the first obstacle, would the Academy building be standing here? If we let our end down, where will we be in the future?

We know that the originators of Pleasant Hill did have faith--did have a determination because Pleasant Hill school is here today. Father Dodge did not quit at the first obstacle. This school is proof of that. It symbolizes to all the courage, faith, hope, and work of our forefathers. It symbolizes our heritage.

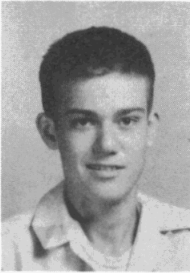
As we go forth into life, we are the pioneers of our future, forefathers to destiny; we must keep this faith in Pleasant Hill, believe in her past, build in her future.

He gloried in strength and daring, not for himself, but for those who were weak and dependent upon him. He determined to hold on to his ideals, not for selfish reasons, but because there were those who would be hurt if he failed. We are grateful for the legacy which Mr. Walter left to us in the message of this hymn.

We, the members of the class of 1953, trust that we will carry this thought with us always. We shall say with the poet:

To thine own self be true,
And it must follow, as the night the day,
Thou canst not then be false to any man.

I, Anna Ruth Dodson, will my position as a forward on the basketball team to Marylyn Baker, in hopes that she will succeed.

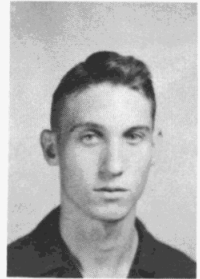
I, Norma Willbanks, will my habit of worrying about the future to Geneva Hargis; the one girl who never seems to care.
